


Introduction

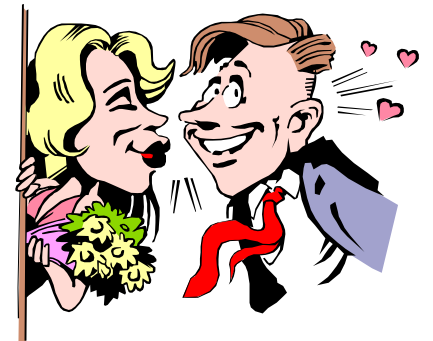
